
Plant, animal, and human communities thrive through our land stewardship

Climate Land Leaders Take Action

Less than five years after landowners came together to form Climate Land Leaders, the Initiative has flourished. By year-end 2024, **190 participants who care for 47,000 acres** were part of the community, all working to ensure that plant, animal, and human communities thrive through our land stewardship. And - through recruitment by current participants - the Initiative is growing fast. 93% of Climate Land Leaders report that they are very likely to recommend this community to a friend.

Climate Land Leaders focus on **implementing natural climate solutions** - planting trees, shrubs, and grasses, restoring wetlands, managing forestlands, and other actions that not only sequester carbon and reduce emissions but also help strengthen biodiversity and provide for healthy soils, cleaner water, vibrant communities, and much more.

Participants share their conservation goals with each other at the beginning of the year and meet throughout the year to address barriers to success. Late in the year, they celebrate each others' successes.

Perennial Stipends Expand Possibilities

To help the Climate Land Leaders achieve their ambitious conservation goals, the Climate Land Leaders Initiative **provided** more than \$50,000 in stipends in 2024.

"The stipend made it possible to devote significant time to invasive species removal," says Paul Mairet of Nine Hazels Farm (MN). Margaret McQuown, Resilient Farms (IA), reports, "The stipend is supporting my transition from production row crops to perennial pasture."

Naima Dhore (MN), pictured to the left, took advantage of Climate Land Leaders' perennial stipend to plant trees and shrubs on the farm she owns with husband Fagas Salah.

Befitting their moniker of "leaders", Climate Land Leaders welcome the opportunity to speak out about the joys and challenges of stewarding land and the need for policy that helps them accomplish the land stewardship that benefits all of us. In opinion pieces, at state legislatures, on Midwest stages, and on their farms, in 2024 Climate Land Leaders made the case for robust, long-term investments in conservation that will reduce the climate toll and taxpayer burden of our current agriculture system and increase the resiliency of our lands and communities.

Soil Testing

The Climate Land Leaders Initiative provided 32 soils consultations in 2024, led by soils consultant Tiffany LaShae (pictured, left) and Dr. Sharon Weyers, U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Service. Participants were provided with easy-to-read reports on their soils from the Cornell University Soil Health Lab.

"In many ways, our impact story is being written beneath the surface of our farm," says Jackie de Batista (IL) (pictured, right). "Tiffany showed me plant roots and soil life beneath the surface - good signs that we are building carbon and protecting our soil resource through our management."


